Don't be a victim.

The best way to avoid scams, fraud, and other problems with contractors is to be proactive from the very beginning. If you neglect to take precautions during the hiring process, you may end up hiring a contractor who doesn't complete the job, fails to do it well, or worse, takes the money and runs.

We created this guide to help you avoid those situations, outlining the necessary steps, questions, and documents you need to safeguard your money, property, and sanity.

THE BASICS

- ONLY hire licensed and insured contractors
- Do not make oral argreements
- Always have all contracts in writing

CHECK A CONTRACTOR LICENSE:

You can verify a contractor's license and/or registration number by contacting the Louisiana Contractor Board at 1-800-256-1392 or by visiting www.lslbc.louisiana.gov.

PROJECTS THAT REQUIRE A STATE REGISTRATION:

Home improvement projects on existing residential structures with a value exceeding \$7,500 but not in excess of \$75,000. This registration does not cover swimming pools.

PROJECTS THAT REQUIRE A STATE LICENSE:

A Commercial license is required for:

- Commercial projects with a value of \$50,000 or more
- Electrical/Mechanical/Plumbing projects exceeding \$10,000
- Hazardous Material projects with a value of \$1 or more

A Residential license is required for:

- Residential new construction exceeding \$75,000 of any residential structure
- Home Improvement projects on existing residential structures exceeding \$75,000

A Mold Remediation license is required for:

 Mold remediation projects with a value of \$7,500 or more

01	SOLICITS DOOR-TO-DOOR If a stranger is knocking, they could be a scammer or worse.		
02	NOT LOCAL Be cautious if they fail to provide a local		

- aladdress or local telephone number.
- OFFERS LEFTOVER MATERIALS Be suspicious if they just happen to have leftover materials from previous jobs.
- **DISCOUNTS FOR REFERRALS** It's not standard to offer discounts in exchange for referring customers.
- ONLY WORKS FOR CASH UPFRONT Do not hire someone who demands payment in cash or upfront for the job.

- Of CONTRACT HAS BLANK SPACES

 Don't sign a contract before reading it in full, and be wary of blank spaces.
- ASKS YOU TO GET THE PERMIT

 It's not standard to ask the homeowner to acquire the building permit.
- ASKS TO USE HOME AS SECURITY

 Wants to borrow money from a friend

 or use your house as security for a loan.
- HIGH PRESSURE SALES TACTICS

 Don't succumb to high pressure tactics

 meant to scare or intimidate you.
- 1 CLAIMS IT'S A "DEMONSTRATION"

 Avoid contractors who claim the job

 will be used as a "demonstration."



A CONTRACTOR

TAKE THE FOLLOWING STEPS:

01

GET AT LEAST THREE BIDS

Each contractor should provide a detailed & itemized bid for the same scope of work.

02

REQUIRE PROOF OF INSURANCE

Including worker's compensation and general liability. Call insurer to confirm.

03

VERIFY EVERYTHING

Addresses, references, and licensing. Contact LA State Licensing Board. 04

REFUSE LARGE DOWN PAYMENT

Reputable contractors only require a down payment of 10-25% of total price.

05

PAY FOR MATERIALS YOURSELF

And have materials delivered to your home or job site -- not the contractor's shop.

06

GET EVERYTHING IN WRITING

Never accept verbal guarantees or agreements and always get signatures.

07

KEEP TRACK OF CHANGES

Any changes to the contract should be in writing and initialed by both parties.

PAY BY CHECK OR MONEY ORDER

Don't use cash -- ever. Write all checks to the company, not the worker.

CONTRACTOR CHECKLIST

When hiring a contractor, make sure you have the following information:

Contractor's name, local address, and phone number
Insurer's name, policy number, and amount
Louisiana contractor's license number
Ensure their references check out
Written Contract & Guarantee that specifies the start and end date, the exact description of work to be done, the total cost of the job, and the schedule for payment
Provide specific samples, model numbers, pictures, and graphics detailing <u>exactly what you want</u> , right down to the materials you want the contractor to use & their estimated cost

CONTRACT CHECKLIST

Before signing on the dotted line, make sure the contract contains:

Contractor's name, address, phone number, license number, and insurance information
A payment schedule for the contractor, subcontractors, and suppliers
A start and completion date
The contractor's obligation to obtain all necessary permits
How change orders will be handled
A detailed list of materials including quantity, color, model, size, brand name, and product
Warranties and guarantees covering materials and workmanship
Description of labor and services not included in the price
